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This newsletter is published biannually by the *Friends of Hart Mountain National Antelope Refuge* for the benefit of its members. Copies are also made available to visitors and through various other outlets in Lake County.

The *Friends of Hart Mountain National Antelope Refuge* is an independent, non-profit, 501(c)(3), corporation dedicated to supporting the primary purposes for which the Hart Mountain National Antelope Refuge was established: to provide habitat and breeding ground for pronghorn antelope and other species of wildlife; for the protection of natural resources; and the development of incidental wildlife-oriented recreation where it does not interfere with the primary purposes of the Refuge.

## In-holding Acquisition Update At Hart Mountain NAR by Ken Guza, President Friends of Hart Mountain

In April 2009 the Fish and Wildlife Service (FWS) closed on the purchase of a 40 acre parcel within the refuge boundary. This property was offered for sale by the estate of the owner. The funds for this purchase came from three sources, dedicated funds raised by the Friends organization in 2008-09, a foundation match for the funds raised by the Friends, and funding from the FWS.

The FWS will soon complete the purchase of 564 upland acres near the SW corner of the refuge with a property that overlooks Hart Lake to the North and Crump Lake to the South. This is an important boundary property due to its size and location. Because of its location it will simplify the task of improving and completing fencing along the western side of the refuge as it eliminates the need for 2 miles of fence construction.

The 40 and 564 acre parcels represent almost one sixth of the total acreage of private in-holdings. The goal is to protect the refuge from adverse development. Acquisition of properties is one but not the only strategy for protecting the integrity of land within the refuge. The FWS is working on an agreement with the Order of the Antelope (OOTA), a major land owner within the refuge. OOTA\* does not want to sell or develop their property holdings but at the same time the organization is committed to conservation at Hart Mountain. The agreement between OOTA and FWS provides for shared management goals of properties which accomplishes goals comparable to outright acquisition.

During July-August 2009, the FWS contracted for appraisals on a set of individual properties where owners have indicated a potential interest in selling. When those appraisals are completed we expect that there will be additional opportunities to purchase properties.

How do we fund purchases? In April, the

seed money was raised by the Friends. The Friends need to continue it's fund raising efforts in order to offer match for grants. The FWS service can periodically offer funds for this purpose but by itself this is not a sufficient funding source and the lead time required to access these funds may be too slow. We are developing an agreement with another organization that is willing to serve as a fiscal agent to raise funds dedicated to acquisition at Hart Mountain. Having a dedicated funding source is important because timely action to purchase properties can be critical in situations where an owner is considering competing purchase offers or an event such as a death prompts an estate to dispose of assets. The risks are real! There have been negative consequences of the sale and development of three properties at Sheldon National Wildlife Refuge in Nevada.

It should be noted that the initiatives of acquiring in-holdings and the fencing along the refuge boundaries does not effect current uses of the refuge - it does not lock out the public. The initiatives carry forward the original vision for creating the refuge, protecting a large tract of land as habitat for pronghorn antelope.\*

Now is the time to acquire in-holdings from willing sellers. We are excited about the acreage acquired and the future possibilities to protect the integrity of the refuge.

\*Many people do not realize that the Lake County Chamber of Commerce and the Order of the Antelope were impetus that led to the creation of Hart Mountain National Antelope Refuge. Local leaders were concerned about the declining numbers of antelope and the loss of large scale habitat needed by antelope. Their successful leadership and lobbying, beginning in the late in 1920s led directly to the establishment of Hart Mountain National Antelope Refuge.

#### **MESSAGE FROM THE REFUGE By Marla Bennett**

#### 2009 Hunting Results

Six of the 8 hunting seasons for Hart Mountain have been accomplished. Below is a table indicating hunting results thus far.

Pronghorn Bow Hunt 15 Harvested, 71% success.

Mule Deer Bow Hunt #1 3 Harvested, 15% success.

Mule Deer Bow Hunt #2 6 Harvested, 33% success.

Bighorn Sheep (2 hunts) 4 Harvested, 80% success.

Pronghorn Rifle Hunt 28 Harvested, 97% success.

Because of high pronghorn numbers most hunters are able to harvest a pronghorn each year.

Mule deer numbers have declined across the west, so most hunters on Hart Mountain in the last years have not been able fill their tags.

#### **Volunteers**

Each summer, more volunteer hours are logged than employee hours. More than 4,335 hours were volunteered to Hart Mountain in the 7 months between mid-March and mid-October, most of them by 9 regular volunteers that live for weeks or months on the mountain. 852 hours were volunteered by

Oregon Natural Desert Association.

Volunteers counted sage grouse and mule deer; built a fence at the CCC Campground; cleaned outhouses; made maps; mowed the pasture; removed interior fencing; arranged for in-holdings purchases; applied for grants; set points for bird point counts; built a picnic pavilion at the CCC Camp; searched for raptor nests; fixed, cleaned, and organized the buildings and grounds; copied and folded brochures; made spread sheets; greeted visitors; accomplished office work and MORE! We could not get along without our volunteers. Thank you volunteers for all you do!

#### Sage Grouse Lek Counts

Sage grouse gather each spring in historic lekking grounds to participate in elaborate sunrise displays. Males put on new spring outfits, including plumes atop their heads and bright green patches above their eyes. They fill air sacs on their chests and flop them up and down, erect tail feathers into perfect stars, and droop their wings while they strut majestically, often bumping chests to show their amazing machismo. Female grouse trundle along in cryptic colors, seemingly paying no attention to the male show as they pluck sagebrush buttercups or new spring grasses. Mating takes mere moments, after

which the female shakes her feathers and mosies away from the lek. The male will continue his displays unabated. Nest building begins shortly.

This year Hart Mountain employees and volunteers counted sage grouse on their leks from March 16-May 1. The total number of males seen at leks was higher this year (543) than last (312), which was the lowest count since 2001. The increase could well be attributed to better access, so more leks were counted. Trend leks (leks that are counted each year) indicate higher numbers this year (276) than last (198) although we noticed that many leks had few or no birds, indicating that birds had moved off historic leks and possibly moved to other leks. We also found birds lekking where no leks were present in the past. This renders yearly comparisons by lek impossible. Tricky birds! We can only hope that sage grouse numbers are climbing on Hart Mountain.

### Barn Roof Replacement by Diana Larson-Mills

The distinctive stone barn at the refuge headquarter is one of the buildings constructed by the Civilian Conservation Corp in 1937-38. The original cedar shingle roof is still on the barn and in desperate need of replacement. The roof is losing shingles and every high wind blows off additional shingles. As a result there is some leakage and beginning of water damage to the interior. The cost of cedar shingles is \$13,000 to \$15,000 dollars depending on the price at the time of purchase. Because the barn is a historic building the roofing needs to look like the original. A master carpenter who specializes in historic buildings for the FWS is available to oversee the work. This will be a great volunteer opportunity once we secure funding for the roofing materials.

With a backlog of historic buildings in need of repairs at the Hart-Sheldon complex, as well as at other refuges within the national refuge system, near term funding from FWS is not expected. Last spring Friends member Diana Larson-Mills applied for grant specific to historic buildings. A grant award appears unlikely. We are looking for funding sources. As with other grant applications, a match is required. If you would like to see the barn roof replaced, a dedicated donation would be appreciated. If you know of potential

funding sources for historic buildings please let us know by email to dianaken@olywa.net.

The Friends of HMNAR have been working with U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service to find funding and volunteer labor to replace the barn roof. The roof has lost many shingles and is leaking and needs replacement as soon as possible to prevent damage to the building. The Friends have applied to a Foundation for funding to cover the cost of materials. The Foundation is interested in our project and we are hopeful that we will receive a grant to purchase the roofing materials. If the funding is available to purchase the materials, the job will happen as soon as the weather and availability of staff permit.

What we need from the Friends of Hart Mt. NAR is:

- 1. Dedicated "Barn Roof" donations to be used as match.
- 2. Volunteers to work under the direction of US F&W staff to actually take off the old and put on the new roof.

## In-holding Acquisition Fund by Ken Guza

The lead article references the Friends successful effort to raise funds dedicated to the acquisition of property inholdings. Significant progress has been made. While we now have partners in this effort it is important that the Friends of HMNAR continue the acquisition for use as match in grant applications for future acquisition opportunities. For this reason we are asking you to join my wife, Diana, and me in making a tax deductible dedicated contribution to the acquisitions fund.

#### Fence Removal 2009

Volunteers and staff at Hart Mountain NAR have been working on the continuing project of removing all unnecessary fencing from the refuge. Originally the fences were needed for the containment of the livestock on the refuge. Now, since the livestock has been removed from the refuge, we are working to remove the fences that are not needed. When the project began, there were approximately 213 miles of unnecessary fence on the refuge. During the past 15 vears, volunteers and staff have removed about 205 miles of fence, which leaves about 8 miles remaining to remove. In August 2009, Oregon Natural Desert Association (ONDA) removed 2.25 miles of unnecessary fence. We would like to thank ONDA for their help with this worth while service project. We also want to thank Hart Mountain Volunteer George Revnolds for his leadership and support to make it happen.

#### Historic Buildings on Hart Mountain

Last spring, Lou Ann Speulda-Drews, Historian/Historical Archaeologist, U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service, visited HMNAR and conducted a site visit of historic ranch properties. She is working on the process of verifying that these properties meet the definition of historic properties. It is our hope that we will then be able to apply for funding to stabilize them, to prevent further deterioration. One site in particular, the Flook Ranch, has the possibility of becoming an interpretive site for the ranching history on the refuge. At the Flook site, there are several building styles that could give visitors a view into the past. While creating an interpretive site at that location is likely many years in the future, getting the buildings on the historic register is an essential first step. Once they have that classification, we will look for stabilization and interpretive funding.

#### **Special Events Planner**

The Friends of Hart Mountain NAR has been awarded grant funding from the Fish and Wildlife Foundation. This grant will be used to pay for a "Special Events Planner" and the costs associated with offering events at HMNAR. We will received the \$5000 (the grant maximum) later this fall. Early in 2010 the Friends plan to contract with a "special" events coordinator. That person will plan and carry out 10 "special" events (5 each the summer of 2010 and 2011). The events, such as wildlife photography, bird identification, geology, archeology, will take place at or near HMNAR.

#### Friends of Hart Mountain Board Meeting June 26, 2009

Minutes of FHMNAR Board Meeting FWS Conference Room

#### 1. Introductions of Attendees: Board: Ken Guza, Anne Woods, Nadine Reynolds, Amy Hutchinson, Margaret Zimet; Staff: Paul Steblein; Members: Diana Larsen-Mills, Rachelle Huddleston-Lorton, Sandy Humphreys, Morrie Chappel.

#### 2. Agenda Changes:

Changes noted for discussion within the agenda.

#### 3. Treasurer's Report;

General Fund (including donations to the George H. Woods Memorial Fund) as of the end of June:

#### 4. Barn Roof Replacement

Diana asked that \$1300 be set aside as match for the grant application to the Oregon Historical Society to replace the barn roof. The request was approved unanimously.

Paul is in favor of the project. FWS funding for historic building is limited and competitive. The barn roof isn't the first priority even within the Hart-Sheldon complex. With grant fund a master carpenter with FWS is available to oversee the project and volunteers can be used.

- 5. Minutes from April 10, 2009 A short and long version of the April minutes, by Ken and Anne respectively, were provided and discussed. The discussion covered the pro and cons of both versions. Bylaws do not require verbatim minutes. A motion to use a short version was made and approved with a vote of 4 to 2. Anne will retain both versions as part of the record.
- 6. Update on HMNAR and Sheldon NWR -Paul Steblein - High Desert Weed Management provided a \$9,000 grant for weed eradication. George Reynolds has been handling some of this work and next year a scout troop will be involved.

Closing on the purchase of the Glass House property is pending. Diana suggested use of the property for fee as is done with USFS lookouts. There was board interest in this idea. Paul said the idea would require review of policies on camping on the refuge gener-

Paul reported that Brad Winter, Lake County Commissioner is interested in the Recreation lope to have a cooperative agreement re-Plan for the refuge and the boat ramp at Hart garding management of OOTA properties at

The Regional Director and Chief of Refuges are visiting the refuges next week. A potluck is planned at Hart Mt. for July 1st. Board members and volunteers are invited to at-

Morrie asked about recent communication regarding computer replacements at Hart Headquarters. He knows of a firm that can refurbish the current equipment. Amy added that the library has purchased revamped/ used PCs through Aventa. Paul will check on the PCs and especially security for the one owned by the Friends.

Paul reported on the proposed Ruby Pipeline Frederick painting: which would cross 35 miles of the Sheldon Refuge. June 18th was the start date for public comments. FIRK is railroading all agencies to push this project, which is contrary to refuge infrastructure. Rachelle, who is familiar with this project through her work said that the pipeline project needs to look at alternative routes other than the refuge. Ruby Pipeline has stated that if they have to go through California there would be no pipeline given California laws. Western energy considers a more southerly route more feasible. Conservation groups and the tribes oppose the pipeline and will testify at the meetings.

Paul stated that there is a need for more interpretation spots either at the refuge, the new visitor center or at the library. We need Visitor facility funds, exhibit funds and letters of support from the Friends on funding requests from FWS. Paul will develop a proposal, a concept plan and identify potential partners.

Diana suggested the Flook ranch be our first choice for Preserving American Treasures. She is willing to work on the planning. Paul suggested that Senator Reid has an interest in this area.

7. Stauts of Memorandum of Agreements The MOA between the Friends and ONDA has not yet been executed as ONDA wants an agreement with FWS relative to transferring properties as they are acquired. A template for an agreement between FWS and ONDA is being reviewed by both parties that addresses questions.

Paul has had meetings with Randy Utley and Joe Barry on a MOA with Order of the Ante-

In Nevada a coalition of organizations is coming together to coordinate conservation efforts. It includes Nevada Bighorn, Sierra Club and Friends of the Nevada Wilderness.

#### 8.Other Business

Board:

The three current officers agreed to stay on for another year.

Sandy Humphreys is interested in joining the board. If voted in by the board, after review of qualifications, the board will still have two vacancies.

The painting needs to be cleaned professionally. The board approved the permanent loan of the painting to the new Lake County Library when it is completed in 2010. Ken will research a loan agreement for use. The idea of having prints made and sold by the Friends was suggested and this might be possible with permission of the artist. Nadine or Anne will talk with Nolte's in Lakeview about insurance for the painting.

#### Visioning Meeting

Ken will contact Marguerite Hill about participating in the spring Friends workshop. He will also talk with her about a planning meeting at Hart to explore ideas on growing the capacity of the Friends that includes stakeholders.

#### Netting the Sun

Anne was authorized to purchase copies of "Netting the Sun" for sale by the Friends at the refuge or the Visitor center.

#### Volunteer Recognition

There was discussion of a volunteer recognition event in October to be held at the CCC camp or the new Visitor Center. The event will recognize the work of volunteers and organizations and could include award for service hours and possibly a dinner.

Meeting adjourned.




#### **BOOKS FOR SALE**
